## **FAFSA**

Free Application for Federal Student Aid

### What do I need to complete the FAFSA

- Your social security number
- Driver's License number (if you have one)
- Your Alien Registration (if you are not a U.S. citizen
- Federal tax information, tax documents, or tax returns, including IRS W-2 information, for you and your spouse, if married) and for your parents if you are a dependent student

- IRS form
- Foreign tax return or IRS Form 1040 NR.
- Records of your untaxed income such as child support, interest income, and veterans noneducation benefits, for you and your parents if you are a dependent student
- Information on cash; savings and checking accounts balances, investments including stocks and bonds, and real estate (not including your current home you live in)

# Creating an FSA ID

- Tip: Use your FSA ID to start your FAFSA form.
- When you create your FSA ID, be careful to enter your name and Social Security number exactly as they appear on your Social Security card. Then, if you go to fafsa.gov to start your application and indicate that you are the student, you will be given the option to enter your FSA ID or to enter your "identifiers" (your name, date of birth, and SSN).

If you log in with your FSA ID, certain information (including your name, Social Security number, and date of birth) will be automatically loaded into your application. This will prevent you from running into a common error that occurs when your verified FSA ID information doesn't match the information on your FAFSA form. Additionally, you won't have to provide your FSA ID again to sign your FAFSA form electronically or to use the IRS Data Retrieval Tool (IRS DRT) if you're eligible.

The student is the one applying for financial aid, so be sure it's the student entering their FSA ID in the "I am a student and want to access the FAFSA form" section. **Do not start** the FAFSA form by supplying the parent's FSA ID in the student role.





#### Decide What You Want in a College

Ask yourself what's important to you, where you want to be and who you want to become. Then you can figure out what types of colleges will allow you to reach your goals.

Here are some aspects to consider:

- Size
- Location
- Distance from home
- Available majors and classes
- Housing options
- Makeup of the student body
- Available extracurricular activities
- Campus atmosphere

Also, think about what you want to accomplish in college. Do you want to train for a specific job or get a wide-ranging education? If you have a major in mind, are the colleges you're considering strong in that area?

#### Keep an Open Mind

While it's good to have some ideas in mind about what sorts of colleges will be right for you, stay open to all the possibilities at the beginning of your search.

Also, think about what you want to accomplish in college. Do you want to train for a specific job or get a wide-ranging education? If you have a major in mind, are the colleges you're considering strong in that area?

Challenge your assumptions about what will work for you.


Talk to people who know you.
